Notes from the meeting on 28 November 2012 at Spondon Village Hall

Community Safety Policing Priorities: Anti Social Behaviour a. Chapelside, Chapel Street, Sitwell Street b. Edmund Road	Spondon SNT are concentrating on ASB and crime in Spondon with Chapelside as the main focus. There are no issues being reported at Edmund Road. On Chapelside interventions taking place including Friday nights specifically. Working with partners and engaging with young people and signposting to positive activities. ASB related incidents in and around Chapel Side are being tackled by; 1. Increased patrols in the areas of Chapel Side and surrounding streets, submitted ASB referrals where appropriate, confiscated alcohol, moving groups on. 2. An anti-sit bar placed on the low wall outside AW LYMN funeral directors, which is acting as a deterrent for groups of youth to gather and sit in the area at the front. 3. Delivering an alcohol intervention project one Friday per month and, in conjunction with partners including 'Breakout' (young persons drug and alcohol misuse service) and 'Safe and Sound' (drink and sexual awareness agency). This is where Police officers go out with these workers to engage with the young people and increase awareness and education of drug and alcohol misuse. 4. A 'Mosquito' (high-frequency alarm) is already on Chapel side near the Co-op. 5. Mobile 3G Camera installed on the precinct, which will provide a good deterrent to the group causing ASB and will assist us identifying persons involved. 6. Patrols with officers from the Licensing team in Derby with a view to education into selling alcohol to persons under 18, or people who are purchasing on behalf of persons under the age of 18. 7. OZBOX sessions at the Village Hall to engage with the youth		
Autocrime and Dwelling and Non Dwelling Burglaries	and provide something to do in the evening, and will hopefully draw them away from Chapel Side. Operation Eason, covert and plain clothes patrols take place at all times of day to tackle burglaries and vehicle crime. Targeting known individuals. A significant amount of the cars have been left unlocked which makes it easier for the thieves. In recent operations in Spondon we regularly find 8-10% of vehicles left unlocked, something we are hoping to change by passing on the message "Lock it or Lose It. Posters been erected.		
Break ins around Dale Road. Have the break ins from Bonfire weekend been addressed?	Yes, perpetrator has been arrested		
Parking on Footways – What are the Police doing about people who park on footways	If the Police witness vehicles parked on a footway and most importantly it is causing an obstruction preventing people from getting past, then the Police will take action. Residents need to contact the Police on tel 101.		
Road Safety on West Road.	Councillor Poulter responded that the Board and Partners are aware		



am concerned about the extent of parking and speeding on West Road when children are walking to and from school. Especially outside the Guide Hut and the Almhouses. Springfield School numbers will also be increasing and more pupils will be driven to the school. It is only a matter of time before there is an accident. Could traffic calming measures be installed?

of the issues on West Road and are working with the schools. He does not support traffic calming but will continue to offer advice and work with the schools to support them to make West road a safe place to be. Travel plans are being looked at again. Spondon SNT have visited West Road after school and have taken action to advise drivers to park more considerately. They will continue to visit the area. Springfield School report that information about considerate driving and parking is put into regular parents newsletters. The school anticipate only 4 new pupils attending the school in September as result of the extended service now being offered at the school. Traffic Management continuing to investigate the issues raised and are in discussion with West Park School to continue to educate and raise awareness of park and driving safely.

Environment and Parks

Sitwell Street Wall – repairs – What is the progress on replacing the wall? If the application is successful and plans to develop the proposal do not take place for some time, how will the Council ensure the wall is rebuilt sooner and not later?

The Planning Application for new housing was approved on 13 December 2012 with numerous conditions attached as part of the development affecting the wall and its reinstatement. Full details of the conditions can be found at the planning portal link:

- 10) Before development of the dwelling and garage commences, the reinstatement and rebuild of the boundary wall, fronting Sitwell Street, shall have been completed in accordance with the approved details and to the satisfaction of the Local Planning Authority.
- 11) Before works commence on reinstatement and rebuild of the boundary wall fronting Sitwell Street, precise details of the wall foundations, including pile and beam construction, shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority and implemented in accordance with such agreed details.

Housing

Craddock Avenue
Development – What is the latest regarding the Housing Development.

Building work progressing well. Regarding the open space area and plans to develop community allotments. Now confirmed that since Derby and Derbyshire Groundworks went into Administration in 2012, Groundworks Leicester are unable to take over the work required for the new allotments on the Craddock Ave open space.

The Housing Development Team are currently in the process of identifying another person/organisation who will be able to take this scheme on and drive it forward.

Riverside identified a budget to contribute towards the cost of the works on the open space. Main expenses will be the new fence that will need to be erected around the land which will secure the site. Removal of the mound on the land has taken place and, as an interim measure, the area will be seeded so it is left in a tidy condition and can still be maintained until more substantial works can proceed. It is unfortunate that, due to the current financial climate, one of our main partners (Groundworks) has gone into administration causing a significant delay but we are still committed to providing a new allotment facility for the community and are continuing to work towards that aim.

Streetpride and Highways

Bus electronic timetables. What is the point in the electronic displays now on bus stops in Spondon? What is their purpose? How much did they

Councillor Poulter responded that the trent barton signs do not currently have real time information. Public Transport have confirmed the total cost of the real time information signs in Spondon was just over £20,000. This was funded by money from section 106 which was specific for public transport measures.



cost? There are two types of displays – those for Arriva displaying time due and those for Trent Barton showing timetable. Will any be replaced? Trent barton are about to update their ticket machines to a more advanced system which will have the real time equipment built into it. Until the new ticket machines are installed the signs will continue to display scheduled time only.

The new ticket machines are likely to arrive mid 2013, so the signs should start showing real time information soon after that.

Pedestrian Crossing by ASDA entrance. Can the access slip road crossing be improved for pedestrians such as installing a zebra crossing?

It is not permitted to mix signals and zebra crossing facilities at the same junction. At this location traffic approaches from one direction only and is slowing for a Give Way junction. We are not aware of any specific difficulties at this point and there are no pedestrian injury accidents recorded at this junction in the past 3 years which would justify controlled crossing facilities.

Street Lights and Cycling
Safety Can the street lights be
programmed to come on when
it gets dark rather than at
'lighting up' time? This will make
it safer for cyclists

Lighting up time is half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise. Streetlights generally have sensors to detect light levels. Depending on local conditions, such as storm clouds or clear sky and lots of local trees/high buildings or open spaces street lights will come on at different times when the sensor indicates lighting levels have dropped. Derby has seen a step change in lighting standards as part of the Lighting Derby investment project. Evidence from road collision database shows a reduction in killed and serious collisions of 35% between 2006 and 2011. Along with this evidence and reductions in road safety activities as part of the budget savings for next year there seems little justification for a specific lighting road safety campaign. We currently deliver a successful "be bright be seen" campaign with support from Spondon Board

Parking on Church Street.

What are the plans to reduce parking outside St Werburghs School on Church Street? Parking spills onto other roads including Park Lane when parents drop off and collect children and during church activities. Drivers park on both sides of the road which could impede emergency vehicles. Visibility on Church Street by Park Lane is reduced and traffic goes into the middle of the road and meets head on. Can double yellow lines be put in?

When the Police attend, they find that parking and traffic flow is acceptable, recognising that people do change their behaviour when the Police are seen. The parking does slow down traffic which in turn makes the area safer.

Councillor Poulter responded that Spondon Board are aware of residents concerns and have worked to reduce the problems by:

- Developing a Sub Group that is working up a parking/Transport strategy
- Supporting a walking bus to the school
- Allocating extra time for Civil Enforcement Officers to patrol the area to give advice

Aim to make the location safe for school children and drivers, evidence shows that parking reduces speeds and prevents collisions. Traffic Management response: Visited the locality after school on a Wednesday in January. Whilst, there was a considerable amount of on-street parking, I did not feel that any of the parking would cause an obstruction to emergency service vehicles. I have checked the personal injury police accident records and there is no record of any collision on Church Street or Park Road in the last three years. Increased levels of on-street parking at school arrival and dispersal times encourages drivers/vehicles to take extra care (drive more slowly) along this stretch and this mitigates the reduced visibility for drivers, entering and exiting junctions as has been evidenced by the excellent accident record at this junction with no injury accidents in the last three years.

Yellow lines typically are only proposed on traffic management or road safety grounds, there is no case for them here. Yellow lines around schools are notoriously parked on because taking young children to and from school is considered as loading and unloading.



What's Happening in Spondon

Spondon Town Team Awarded £10,000

Spondon Traders Association(STA), Spondon Community Association and Spondon Neighbourhood Board working together as the Village Management Team has been awarded £10,000 from the Portas Lipot Funding to help deliver some improvements in Spondon. The aim is to use the £10,000 investment to contribute to improve, develop, sustain the Village Centre as a place to visit and shop. The outcome of the recent survey conducted by STA has confirmed the priority to improve parking within the Village Centre.

In addition to the funding the Spondon Town Team Partner will have access to support, advice, and information, free membership of the Association of Town Centre Management (ATCM) until the end of the year and the provision of a Town Team Special Advisor.

organised by






Village Improvement Committee - Improvements to **Dale Road Park**

Spondon Sensory Garden Carving

Spondon Neighbourhood Board has funded and commissioned Andrew Frost to produce a wildlife carving


on the Yew tree that was dying and has now been reduced in height at the rear of the Sensory garden on Chapel Street.

The initial design for the carving is shown here. The aim is to provide a point of interest that will attract and inspire all generations. It can be viewed as creative and educational, illustrating the food chain with animals, birds and plants. The idea is based on a 'wildlife tree'.

It will be filled with 'windows' containing animal faces balanced at the bottom of the trunk with a 'friendly' green man face.

The nature of yew trees is that they have deep fissures and twists within the trunk. This means that the final is likely to change as the work develops. When carving the tree will be able to understand composition and balance and overall size and spacing of carvings.

Work will be taking place during March.



Spondon Board Funding Togo Nogo Theatre in Schools

Spondon Neighbourhood Board has funded Pedestrian Training for Year 2 Pupils at Spondon Schools including the 'Togo Nogo' Theatre. The aim is to make our children safer on their journey to and from school through education of children and their parents and carers.

The aim of the Child Pedestrian Training is to teach year 2 pupils (6/7 years old) how to safely



cross roads on which there are a number of different users. The most commonly cited reason for an accident involving a pedestrian, is simply that they failed to look properly and therefore did not see the oncoming cars. Child pedestrian training encourages pupils to be aware of their surroundings, and teaches them how to keep themselves and others safe. The training consists of classroom theory sessions followed by a practical 'assessment' walk enabling the pupils to demonstrate the three key skills:

- 1. Identifying a safe place
- 2. Crossing between parked cars
- 3. How to cross at junctions

Resources

Each school was allocated a Pedestrian Trainer, who delivered 3 lessons throughout the year. Children learnt through use of a prop road and were given stickers and certificates to collect after successful completion of each skill.



Pupils were shown an interactive DVD which highlights the skills required and general safety rules in an attractive, accessible manner using 2 characters: Togo and Nogo.

Pupils were given worksheets to take home and complete with parents, to reinforce the safety message and keep parents up-to-date with their learning,

At the end of the summer term, pupils

are 'treated' to a theatre production in which 'Togo and Nogo' make a journey home with the help of the pupils newly gained road safety skills. A kinaesthetic and enjoyable method of revising all new skills learnt.



Children were also given the opportunity to use their knowledge practically, when going on 'accompanied walks' with the Pedestrian Trainers and School staff.

Scope and Reach of Child Pedestrian Training

This year, the four Spondon primary schools are taking part, thanks to Board funding, in the Training. Over 200 pupils being taught about the importance of road safety. Popularity of the training has been outstanding, and continues to grow


Cycle Route 66 New Signs in Spondon

Regional Cycle Route 66 provides a circular loop around Derby and is illustrated on the Derby Cycle Map. The City Council has identified that signing can be improved along the section between St Andrews View in Chaddesden going through Spondon to the East Service Road/

A5111 Raynesway.

The plan shows the cycle route where new signs will show key destinations and estimated times to cycle to these locations in minutes. Signing will be provided at junctions or at intervals where route information is deemed necessary. Signs will utilise existing street furniture such as lighting columns wherever appropriate. Residents living near to the proposed signs have all been consulted and no objections were raised by members of the public or external organisations. Spondon Neighbourhood Board provided comments about the sign locations in the conservation area, along Church Street, Sitwell Street and Lodge lane which have been taken on board
